Logline

Ambition and betrayal cause an early 20th century industrialist to commit suicide, leaving his family longing for answers and the attention he never paid them.

Synopsis

Death of an Industrialist: A Family History is a film about Howard Bemis, who committed suicide at age 70 after successfully running a company in Springfield, MA that manufactured an early cellulose nitrate plastic commonly known as celluloid. The story is told visually using photographs and 16mm films taken by Howard Bemis from the 1890's through the 1930's. It is Howard's story told literally through his own eyes. These striking and often artfully framed stills and films evoke another era, and convey a strong sense of both the inner and public life of a successful man who ended up dying by his own hand.

Director's Statement

The idea for *Death of an Industrialist: A Family History* started with my finding a suitcase full of 16mm films taken by my great grandfather, Howard Bemis. Sometime later I came upon several old photo albums belonging to my great grandfather. I was taken by the beauty of the photographs and became curious about all the people in the pictures, who were obviously my relatives. Then three of my great grandfather's leather-bound business journals surfaced, and the accumulated documents seemed to demand that his story be told.

I had known very little about my family history before researching this film. My grandmother had told me that my great grandfather had killed himself when caught in a compromising situation with another woman. My grandmother was a notorious fabricator of tall tales, so I gave her account little credence. But when I hunted down his obituary, there was the suicide in graphic black and white. No explanation for his act was given however. It was a mystery I felt compelled to find some answers to.

I was inspired to use the narative devise employed by Edgar Lee Masters in *The Spoon River Anthology* in which his characters speak in monologue from beyond the grave. Some of what Howard Bemis says is based on his business journals. For the other characters, I extrapolated from what I knew about them from first or second hand experience and from looking at the photos and films. Seeing as Howard had taken all the pictures, it seemed right to let him tell the story. The other characters chimed in demanding to be heard, and I thought it best to stay out of the way.

The story takes place at the turn of the 20th century, a time of great technological and social change with many parallels to the present. The issues of success and failure, the price paid for progress, management-labor relations, balancing work and family, the ramifications of the development of mass media, and the radical changes in modes of transportation are all woven into the fabric of this story. I feel that by looking back at a time gone by there are many things to be learned about the present. I want to share my family's story with the hope that it informs and builds on that which is common to all stories and families
